The following narrative about how this school promotes and supports parental involvement was submitted by this school.

Aiken Elementary School values and promotes family involvement in the education of our students. During our Open House and Curriculum Night presentations, parents and guardians are encouraged to participate in all aspects of the Aiken community, including participation in the PTO and volunteering in classrooms. A volunteer orientation is held in September to orient new parents to the volunteering process. During this past year, our volunteers were recognized through a special recognition breakfast in the spring. Teachers communicate regularly with families regarding students' progress within the curriculum, through newsletters, e-mails, notes and phone calls. In addition, teachers meet with parents in conferences to review progress in report cards in November and March. Teachers provide detailed information regarding homework, school curriculum themes, projects and events that occur at each grade level. This information is also highlighted on our school website. Our school newsletter is also available for families on the website and a PTO webpage has been created so that PTO and school information can be shared. During the next school year we will continue to develop techniques for making our website more user friendly. A presentation on CMT results occurs in the fall for parents of students in third, fourth and fifth grades. In February, an overview of the CMT is provided for parents of third graders. During the 2009-2010 school year, parents, teachers and students continued to beautify the Aiken Nature Trail and plant gardens for Aiken Acres, our school outdoor educational environment. A concert to celebrate our gardens was held in June for Aiken families. Parents and community volunteers also serve as mentors and tutors at Aiken School. Aiken has significantly increased the number of people who are serving as mentors to students during this past year. This year, our PTO supported presenters from the Hartford Stage Company for fourth grade and a musical artist in residence to support the study of Mexico in kindergarten.

EFFORTS TO REDUCE RACIAL, ETHNIC, AND ECONOMIC ISOLATION

Below is the description submitted by this school of how it provides educational opportunities for its students to interact with students and teachers from diverse racial, ethnic, and economic backgrounds.

Aiken School has continued to initiate a number of community service projects and school-based activities during this school year as a way of reaching out to other members of the Aiken, West Hartford and international communities. In October, as part of a Make a Difference Day initiative, students collected non-perishable food items to support the West Hartford Food Pantry, Foodshare and Jewish Family Services. In December, a coat and toy drive was conducted to benefit the Burgdoff Adult and Pediatric Center in Hartford. In January, our school hosted guest teachers from the Shandong Province of China. The teachers visited classrooms and spoke with students. One of our Aiken parents and a fifth grade student served as translators during the visit. Aiken students had the opportunity to learn about the school programs in China and share some of the programs happening at Aiken School. During two weeks in February, Aiken School teamed with Webster Hill and Norfeldt Schools to raise money for the victims of the earthquake in Haiti. The fund drive, entitled "Hearts Across West Hartford for Haiti," raised over \$10,000 for the earthquake victims. Aiken students focused on reading and collected pledges for each page of reading that was completed. Students graphed the pages read and the money collected. The fundraiser culminated with a program at the Town Hall. In April our Student Council conducted a can and plastic bottle drive to encourage conservation and to raise money to beautify our Aiken Acres gardens. The second annual Aiken International Night was held in February as a way of celebrating the rich diversity of the Aiken community. This multi-cultural family-oriented event focused on learning about customs, heritage and cultures through the sharing of informational displays, ethnic foods and music and dance performances.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLANS AND ACTIVITIES

The following narrative was submitted by this school.

During the 2009-2010 school year, Aiken teachers and staff have worked on implementing Scientifically Research-Based Interventions (SRBI) with the goal of increasing student mastery of curriculum objectives in reading and decreasing referrals to special education. Teachers developed consistent, effective Tier One interventions at each grade level, with a focus on kindergarten and first grade students. Specific programs were utilized to build early literacy skills (Zoo Phonics and Fundations). Individual student intervention plans were designed to set short term learning objectives and carefully monitor student progress. One teacher at each grade level piloted Universal Assessments to screen students and monitor progress throughout the year. Our classroom teachers, reading specialist, early intervention teacher and special education teacher regularly collaborated on students of concern and provided intensive individual intervention to ensure mastery of objectives. Teachers have worked collaboratively in their grade level teams to review student assessment data, design units of instruction, create common formative assessments and analyze student work to inform daily instruction. As a result, students have made significant progress over the school year on district assessments and in the development of literacy skills. This will continue to be an area of focus for next year as we generalize Universal Assessments with all teachers and design more focused Professional Team Planning at each grade level. Parent involvement and collaboration continues to be an integral component to the success of Aiken School community. Parents volunteer at all grade levels and in a variety of activities to support the larger Aiken community. Parents are encouraged to share their ideas and feedback on school programs and initiatives as we explore the development of a Parent/Teacher Council in the next school year.

SUPPLEMENTAL SCHOOL INFORMATION

The space below was optionally used by this school to describe aspects of the school not presented elsewhere in the profile.

During this year Aiken School has continued to emphasize the qualities of caring, respect and responsibility through developing the leadership competencies of our students in kindergarten through fifth grade. Through our Safety Patrol and Student Council, our older students have been able to serve as role models and mentors for younger students. Our Student Council members in grades two through five sponsor spirit days and fund raisers to help give back to West Hartford and adjacent communities. Students have assisted in classrooms and created a safe and orderly dismissal routine at the close of each school day. Utilization of the Second Step Program and Steps to Respect has assisted in addressing and decreasing incidents of bullying at school. Students are recognized for exemplary achievement in academic and social character traits through weekly Principal Sharing presentations and in having their names placed on a central bulletin board that recognizes students' acts of kindness. During this past year, our students worked with teachers to continue recycling and implement energy saving strategies. Aiken students demonstrate outreach to the larger community through collections for the local food pantry, fund raising for victims of the Haitian earthquake and participating in a book drive for a sister school in an urban community. This year, students also developed in-school service projects called "bucket filling" as a way to assist staff members and build a greater sense of community and responsibility. The Aiken Gardens and Nature Trail continue to flourish under the direction of dedicated teachers, parents and students who have spent time weeding, planting, raking and watering throughout the school year and into the summer. Our gardens are meaningfully linked to the study of curriculum units in science and social studies. A fall and spring clean-up and concert are scheduled each year to celebrate the work of our volunteers. In addition, the Aiken community celebrates and recognizes the work of our volunteers through an annual volunteer breakfast.
